Because of Jesus, there is no mystery without the assurance of faith.

Because of Jesus, there is no darkness without dawn.

For this reason some celebrate the longest night of the year, the winter solstice, with a festival of lights. For this reason we fill the sanctuary with light on Epiphany Sunday. Because a light has shone in the darkness and the darkness did not overcome it.

For this reason we wait, like the world waited on that dark night so many years ago, we wait for the fullness of God's kingdom to be revealed in all its glorious light.


Until then people of faith are but stars set ablaze by the dark night sky, twinkling Christmas lights. How will you shine the light of Christ this Christmas?

MY FIRST AND LAST

This is my last *Menno Beacon* as editor! Yup, I quit. When I started being the editor, I told myself I would quit when it wasn't fun no more. That time has come. I basically am "burned out" doing the *Beacon*. I have put together twenty-eight *Menno Beacons* in six years. Putting the *Beacon* out, takes a lot of my spare time. I do have a day job!

In my faith journey being editor, I have discovered a very important thing about the readers of the *Beacon*, most of you do not regularly attend Menno Church every Sunday. The family of *Beacon* readers are distance members, relatives of someone at Menno, just have an interest in Mennonites, know of someone that lives in the area that goes to church here, had ancestors that lived in this area, or has a family member buried at Menno. That covers a big range of readers. Readers begin at Menno Church's immediate family, to California, to Kansas, to Minnesota, to New York, and to my son in Iraq.

As one former pastor at Menno Church told me, "I read the *Menno Beacon* because I was (I still feel) a part of the Menno Church family. While some of the people I don't know now, I still am encouraged how a rural church can have so much influence on the lives of the people around them".

In my first *Beacon*, I broke down the demographics of where the *Beacon* is mailed to, it hasn't changed. While we at Menno don't think our news isn't much, it can mean a lot to readers from a distance. I have tried several things/ideas in the *Beacon* over the years, some worked, some didn't. I have tried to cover some news and events at our sister church, Warden Mennonite Church, and events at our church camp, Camp Camrec. While Camrec has its own newsletter, *The Chumstick*, it doesn't reach out to some of the *Beacon* readers. Some of those readers have supported Warden and Camrec with their prayers and financial giving.

I see the *Menno Beacon* changing. To keep it going, readers from near and far will have to take an interest in sending information to the *Beacon* editor, or it will slowly die. I also see the *Beacon* changing formats. Whether we like it or not, I see the *Beacon* going out electronically, maybe as an email, part of the Menno Church website, website of its own, or more likely a Blog, Facebook or Twitter page.

In my survey I did on mailing the *Beacon* by paper or electronically, those who responded, 90% wanted the paper version. Some liked the electronic version on Menno's website, because the pictures are in color and so much easier to see. Some didn't care. Some wanted the electronic version because it takes less paper and mailing costs. For those who don't have a computer or access to one, this will be a problem.

With the electronic age here, with computers, smart phones, iPod's, laptops, and tablets, we can reach the world whereever you are. I recently read in a computer magazine, and they noted that the new tablets are not new. History does repeat itself. Years ago, a man named Moses climbed a mountain, (signal was better there) and God wrote on his tablets! His message is still with us today. I wonder how many people (including Christians) will expect Christ to notify us when He comes again on our smart phone, tablet, or any other electronic device? Will we "miss the ark", because we are coming too dependent on such devices?

I would like to thank all of you that responded to the survey. It generated a nice flow of donations for mailing the *Menno Beacon* and I thank you all for your generous donations. There are months that donations coming in have more than covered the mailing costs of the *Menno Beacon*. This also creates a problem, some want the *Beacon* mailed and some would rather look on the website, we need at least 200 pieces to be able to bulk mail, which reduces the cost of mailing down to a third of first class mailing rate. We normally print 250 copies, with about 235 being mailed, the rest delivered manually or archived. I don't see doing both mail and elec-
