### **Bethel College's 125th Anniversary**

Bethel College celebrated its 125th anniversary with its Fall Festival October 11-14, with a number of the Menno Church family participating in the events. Highlights included the dedication of the repurposed Academic Center (formerly Science Hall). This building has a new addition that houses the Nursing Department with state of the art simulation rooms, a beautiful atrium, and renovated classrooms and faculty offices for many of the departments. A new history of Bethel College written by Dr. Keith Sprunger was released for the event. The drama and music departments performed the musical "The Secret Garden" starring Julianna Schrag, granddaughter of Butch and Diane Gering.

Roberta Hodgson also participated in the Bethel College board meetings during the week. Roberta serves as a Pacific Northwest Conference representative to the Board and is willing to visit regarding any questions you may have about Bethel College.

A team from Menno traveled to Bastrop, Texas with Washington MDS during the week of January 13, 2013. The team helped with new construction following the destruction of homes in fires during 2011.



The 2012 Mennonite Country Auction raised about \$121,700. This included over \$56,000 in auction items, one of the highest totals in the MCA's 35-year history! After expenses and proceeds to Ten Thousand Villages, the contribution to MCC was almost \$93,200.

## Clinton C. Claassen

Clinton C. Claassen, 97, of Moses Lake died October 27, 2012. He was born March 30, 1915 to William B. and Anna Claassen in Beatrice, NE, the second of five sons.

In 1929 the family moved to Colfax, WA where he graduated from high school and worked on the family farm. Through church activities he met his partner in life. He married Evelyn Jantz at her father's home near Ritzville on May 31, 1941. They moved to the Ruff area where together they farmed for over fifty years, enjoying the help of numerous friends and relatives during harvest and

other busy times. He was a member of Menno Mennonite Church serving in multiple roles and sharing his love of Jesus with others through his wit, generosity, and gentle smile. He was a devoted husband, father, granddad, and great granddad. Three years after Evelyn's death, he moved to Monroe House in Moses Lake in 2007 where he continued to find joy and strength in the time spent with family and visits to the farm.

Survivors include four children, Sharon (Stan) Meyer of Moses Lake, Eugene (Dorene) of Marlin, Cleon (Elizabeth) of Moses Lake, and Patrice Claassen of North

Newton, KS; seven grandchildren; eight great grandchildren; and two brothers.

He was preceded in death by his wife, Evelyn, and two brothers, Rudolph and Ernest.

His life was honored at services held Friday, November 2, 2:00 pm at Menno Mennonite Church, with burial preceding at the Menno Mennonite Cemetery. Memorials may be designated to the Washington Unit of Mennonite Disaster Service in care of Menno Mennonite Church.

They continued their life together until her untimely death.

## Harris H. Waltner

Harris H. Waltner, North Newton, Kan., a longtime Mennonite pastor, died Nov. 23, 2012.

Harris was born on Jan. 17, 1925 to Henry Jac and Ida (Kaufman) Waltner on the family farm near Freeman, S.D. Harris had an older brother Harold (who died at birth), a younger sister, Hilda, and two younger brothers, James and Calvin.

Harris attended country school and graduated from Freeman Academy and Freeman Junior College in Freeman. He also attended Bethel College in Kansas where he graduated in 1950. While there he met Christine Duerksen who would become his wife on Aug. 15, 1951. They moved to Chicago, Ill., where Harris attended Mennonite Biblical Seminary and received his Master of Divinity degree in 1954.

He was ordained into the ministry at Salem Mennonite Church, Freeman, June 21, 1953 and received his first call to a congregation

from West Zion Mennonite Church, Moundridge, Kan. During this time all three of the Waltner children were born: John (1954), Carol (1955) and Marilyn (1959).

In 1963 the family moved to Ritzville, Wash., where for the next 10 years he served the Menno Mennonite Church. This was punctuated by a 10 month interim pastorate at Maplewood Mennonite Church in Ft. Wayne, Ind., during the 1969-70 school year. In keeping with a 10 year pattern, Harris and Christine accepted a call to the Bethel Mennonite Church in Mountain Lake, Minn. Having had a number of opportunities to travel, Harris and Christine next accepted a call to serve the Maseru United Church in Maseru, Lesotho, Africa.

When they returned, he served the Manhattan Mennonite Church in Manhattan, Kan. After six years as pastor at Manhattan, Harris retired, completing 40 years in the pastoral ministry.

They moved to Kidron Bethel Village in North Newton in 2001.

After living with Alzheimer's for several years his earthly journey ended peacefully on Nov. 23, 2012.

Harris is survived by Christine, his wife of 61 years; his three children: son John and wife Pam, Woodinville, Wash., and their three children, Jonathan and wife Morgan, Portland, Ore., Laura, Seattle, Wash., and Lindsay, Spokane, Wash.; daughter Carol and husband Stan Buller, Lenexa, Kan., and their three children, Sara, St. Louis, Mo., Erica, Lenexa, and Christian, Boulder, Colo.; daughter Marilyn and husband Joe Loganbill, Newton, and their two sons, Reid and Ross. He is also survived by his sister, Hilda and Ken Kaufman, Freeman; sisters-in-law: Lenore Waltner, North Newton, and Shirley Waltner, Freeman. His parents and three brothers, Harold, James and Calvin, preceded him in death.

A memorial service was held at the Shalom Mennonite Church in Newton on Saturday, Dec. 29.

## Albert F. Franz

Albert F. Franz passed away March 11, 2013, at his home on Fir Island, Mount Vernon, WA. He was born August 30, 1917, at the family homestead in Schrag, WA. He was the fourth child of six born to Peter and Agnetha (Ewert) Franz.

The Franzes were German immigrants, from the Crimea area in Russia where they had emigrated on agreement they would teach farming practices in exchange for relief from conscription (military draft).

The family first settled in South Dakota then subsequently settled north east of Warden, WA. Al was raised on the homestead farm near Schrag, graduating from Lind High School in 1934. As the story goes, Al wanted to attend college,

saving money for two years after High School and when his father gave him \$200, he went to WSC and UW, graduating from the UW in Mechanical Engineering. There he met Jane Montgomery, who would become his wife of 58 years.

He served his country during WWII as a civilian working for Boeing as a tooling engineer on various programs including the B47 bomber. Al was an independent thinker, with an entrepreneurial bent and returned to farming in the Columbia Basin Project in Block 49, west of Othello in 1953 with Jane and their two young sons, Paul and Jim. He later joined the Grant Co. PUD working on Priest Rapids and Wanapum dams as construction inspector, mechanical maintenance supervisor, advancing to project engineer. Following retirement, he and Jane

traveled extensively all over the world.

After Jane's death in 2000, Al spent the last 12 years with his special friend, Ruth Wylie, where they spent winters in Palm Springs, and the warm months in Kennewick and then recently on Fir Island.

Albert was preceded in death by his parents, wife Jane, son James, siblings Walter, Arnold, and Bertha Franz. He is survived by his son Paul; grandchildren Dana, Kathryn, Elizabeth, Natalie; siblings Victor and Sylvia (Adams); daughters-in-law Charlene (James) and Rochana (Paul); and his very special friend, Ruth Wylie.

Al was a quiet man, wise, humble and kind. He had a keen intellect,

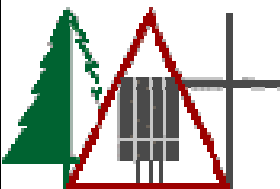
On February 24, 2013, Derek and Susan Schafer and Shawna Yoder were received into membership through a confirmation of faith.
